1. Executive Directors Report, BRSA Projects, Special Reports & Connection Applications

Disaster Recovery Update

- T-4 was delivered and put in place. T-5, T-6 and the Switch Gear are due in May 1st and May 22nd respectfully.
- The RFQ for the Power Resiliency Project went to four firms, one firm was a no show at the Presubmittal meeting. We went to the short list and asked Black & Veatch for a submittal and met with them. Extended the deadline for all four firms to have equal time to put together their qualifications.
- John Napolitano, Mike Samuel, Pete Canal and Robert Fischer met with (MCBOA) Monmouth County Bayshore Outfall Authority Attorney, Engineer, Head Administrative Staff and Technical Staff to discuss the Power Resiliency Project.
- Michelle Heaton started on April 8th as Financial Admin. Asst. and passed all pre-employment background checks and physicals.
- Mr. Fischer introduced Mike Donahue who has been with the BRSA since March 21, 1994. Through the years Mike has become very efficient in running the Incinerator especially during our Stack Tests. Many employees learned the operation of the incinerator from Mike.

• Submitted an application for an Engineering (Summer) Intern to local colleges to help us get the GIS off the ground.

Commissioner McMullen asked if we ever had an intern during the school year. Pete said just during Christmas and/or Spring Break.

- Appoint the Conflict Attorney Manna & Bonello at the same rate as last year.
- Update-NIRO Heat Exchanger-Chavond Barry submitted the spec's for review and we hope to get them out in the next couple of weeks.
- Annual Stack Test for the NIRO Incinerator completed successfully
- Karl Deigert Enterprises, Inc.- approve Final Quantities Change Order in the credit amount of -\$267,814.52 and to authorize

Advertisement for a new Annual Standby Repair & Service Contract.

- Glassworks-requesting a modification to the payment plan. John Napolitano, BRSA Attorney, suggested to bring in both Glassworks and Bell Works to get the projects resolved.
- Waverly Place Keyport for 6 townhouses approve connection and signing of the NJDEP TWA consent form.

Consulting Engineer – R3M

- Odor Control Scrubber #4 waiting for NJDEP to approve protocol and schedule stack test
- Blower Building #1 to Storage Building final design reviewed by BRSA staff. Advertise and receive bids in May.

• Working on 2nd Quarter Flow Report for next month.

Commissioner Steiner asked Manuel if he received the report from Pure. Manuel said Pure is reviewing comments and will have an update next month.

Superintendent's Report

- Flow for March is up slightly from last month.
- Effluent quality is about the same maybe a little worse than last month due to the fact that we chlorinated Plant #1 to prevent a bulking event that was eminent.
- Put an additional aeration tank online in Plant #2 to clear up the effluent.
- No Odor complaints were reported in March
- Incinerator ran on short schedule for work on the concentration tank, safety training and preparation of the Stack Test. From preliminary calculations we made 85% of the limit for every run during the stack test. We did 2 runs Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and ½ day Thursday with no issues and no extra runs. Just have to wait for the results from the Stack Tester on the emissions which will take about a month.

Mr. Fischer said that since other plants have had trouble with the Mercury Scrubber failure we ran the Stack Test with & without using the scrubber. If we pass the Mercury limit without the scrubber we are permitted to continue operating the incinerator even in the event the scrubber must be shut down for repairs. Mike said it is currently in our permit that we can run the incinerator without the scrubber.

- Conducted several interviews for the Operators Position, still looking. Having an interview tomorrow and advertised the position on 4 local college web sites.
- Lab received the Proficiency samples that are complete. Results need to be submitted on the web site and wait for all test to be complete before we know if we passed.

WHEREAS, the project is expected to generate 1,350 gallons per day of wastewater; and

WHEREAS, the Bayshore Regional Sewerage Authority ("Authority") Chief Engineer has reviewed the Developers application and is recommending sanitary sewer connection approval; and

WHEREAS, the Developer has paid the connection fee of \$25,180; and

WHEREAS, the Authority previously approved Resolution No. 78/18 in the credit amount of \$9,075, decreasing the total Contract Value to \$452,116.50; and

WHEREAS, there is need to amend the Contract to adjust the final quantities of work performed and determine the final retainage; and

WHEREAS, the Authority Engineering staff has prepared Change Order No. 2 in the credit amount of \$267,814.52, decreasing the total Contract Value to \$184,301.98; and

WHEREAS, the Plan is intended to assure that all public funds identified within it are deposited and invested in compliance with the terms set forth and required by N.J. S.A. 40A:5-14, and

WHEREAS, Certificates of Deposit ("CD's") are permissible investments under Article VI- (9) of the Plan;

WHEREAS, for the better safety, liquidity and maximum investment return the Authority desires to invest \$3,000,000 in a 12-month CD with TD bank at an interest rate of 2.35%; and

WHEREAS, for the better safety, liquidity and maximum investment return the Authority desires to invest \$2,000,000 in a 12-month CD with Lakeland bank at an interest rate of 2.80%; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Commissioners of the Bayshore Regional Sewerage Authority hereby authorize and ratify the investments so stated in these Authorized Depositories of the Authority.
